EYFS:

Nursery



As part of our term topic 'animals', this week Nursery have been looking at under the sea animals, in all areas of learning. The children have made paper plate jellyfish and painted sea creatures using sentincles. In maths, they have matched the correct number on each sea animal. For literacy we have read the story Tiddler by Julia Donalson and explored how the other fish could demonstrate kindness. To further develop their motor skills, they have threaded different sea animals. In UTW sessions, the children have explored the different animals that live in the sea and discussed their different features.



Reception

In Reception this week we have been talking about people who help us in the community as part of this term's topic. We gathered sticks and leaves from around the school to build our own pretend fire. We then ripped up coloured paper to represent the flames of a fire. The children each dressed up as a firefighter and we used a pump bottle filled with water to put out the fire. We did this whilst singing the song London's Burning. The children enjoyed this activity and learnt all about the role of a firefighter.



YEAR 1

This week, Year 1 has been exploring the magic of nature, observing how their beans have grown, and enjoying the signs of spring! In our circus topic, the children have shown great curiosity about how circuses have changed and created vibrant, colourful posters. We ended the week with a lively celebration of the Lunar New Year, where the children participated in assembly, and designed their snakes and dragons!

YEAR 2

This week, Year 2 has been challenging themselves with multiplication and division. We used several methods such as grouping, bottle cap counting as well as using counters. We also began identifying different types of sentences such as statements, questions, and commands. Everyone enjoyed role playing for this using sentences on the board and acting them out. On Friday, we had our Chinese New Year assembly. It was so nice to share the culture of the New Year with everyone.



YEAR 3

This week, the children in year 3 have continued with their Ancient Egypt topic. They started off by developing their English skills - identifying what the features of information texts were. Then, they revised what they had learnt in humanities lessons and took informal notes and then, they researched extra information using online resources in the ICT classroom. Finally, they collated all of that information and learning and produced their own information texts, which will be in the classroom library for children to read at their leisure.





YEAR 4

This week Year 4 took a fantastic trip to the planetarium and science museum at the Atarik Foundation. They got to see a scale model of a Moroccan dinosaur skull, see real fossilised dinosaur footprints and meteorites found in Morocco. They even got to touch a rock that had come all the way from the asteroid belt, past Mars!

YEAR 5

This week year 5 have integrated more technology into their lessons and learning. This week they have conducted online research for both science and humanities by researching how animals that live in extreme conditions have adapted to survive and the similarities and differences between ancient Athens and Ancient Sparta.





YEAR 6

In humanities, year 6 have been crafting river models out of salt dough. This has assisted in their learning of key features such as meanders, deltas, oxbow lakes and confluences. They enjoyed getting hands on and displaying their understanding of rivers!
